

Phonics and Reading 1

What is phonics?

Phonics is the way the foundations of reading and spelling are taught in school.

What is the link between spoken and printed words?

Written language is like a 'code' that uses the alphabet. When we write a word match a letter or a group of letters for each sound in the word.

Is phonics a teaching method?

No. Phonics is knowledge about the alphabetic code and some skills we need to manage it to read and spell.

What happens in a phonics lesson?

Children are taught how to 'crack the code'.



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Phonics and Reading 2

Beginner Readers

At first children are taught that sounds in spoken words are represented by letters in printed words.



3 sounds



3 letters

Developing Readers

Children learn more about the code.



Sometimes it is not just a single letter that represents a sound. Sometimes it is a group of letters.



3 sounds



4 letters



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Phonics and Reading 4

Advancing Readers

The single letters and groups of letters we write to represent sounds are called graphemes.

Some sounds are represented by more than one grapheme.

t oe



s n ow



n o

Advancing Readers

Some graphemes represent more than one sound.

OW



g r ow



c low n

Children work through a structured phonics programme to learn about the alphabetic code.

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Phonics and Reading 6

Reading

Children 'decode' the word when they read it.



They need to look at each grapheme in the word, one by one, and think what sound each represents.



As they work through the word from left to right, they 'blend' the sounds (push them together) and listen for the word forming.



They can then say what the word is.

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Phonics and Spelling 7

Spelling

Children 'encode' the word when they spell it.



They think about the word and 'segment' it into the sounds one by one.





For each sound they match a sound spelling by writing it down.



They have spelled the word.

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
